	DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE							

This is a two-story frame house in the Greek Revival style. The principal entrance is on the long (south) side, the center one of five bays. A subsidiary entrance is in the center of the east end facing the modern road. The main entrance has a small porch with two columns. To the west there is a one-story wing with a porch across its front. The frieze board, cornice returns, and proportions of the building are those of the maturing Greek Revival style.

However, the interior has a floor plan typical of the earlier late Colonial style. Instead of a central hall, the entrance leads to a shallow vestibule in front of a large central chimney, whose fireplaces open into three principal rooms. The east room is the formal parlor, and its woodwork is more pretentious and purely Greek in style than any other room. There are wide window casings whose entablatures have recessed slightly pointed arches. The east exterior door in this room is wider than the others, a so-called "funeral" door. Two smaller rooms in the rear corners of the house make a total of five on the first floor. This is the typical colonial Connecticut central chimney plam.

All of the main structural timbers of the house, as well as the finish carpentry, are of walnut, as walnut trees were plentiful on the land. The cellar hearth foundations consist of two giant piers of cut sandstone, brought up from the nearby Ohio-Erie canal. Modern plumbing, heating and kitchen facilities have been installed, the cellar floor paved with concrete, and the central chimney was rebuilt under the supervision of a restoration architect in the mid-1960s. The house has undergone intelligent repair and restoration by the present owners since 1963.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This is a house in an excellent state of preservation with characteristic features of both the late Colonial and Greek Revival styles. The house was built in 1838 on the site of a celebrated murder. The builder Robert McKisson was the widower of the victim. Thus the house is a local reference point for an event which occupies ten pages in a standard county history. The murdered woman was the grandmother of the "spectacular" Cleveland mayor Robert E. McKisson (1895-1898), who laid the groundwork for the lakefront civic center.

The murder, which took place on July 24, 1837, was the result of a family quarrel, and the brother of McKisson, David, was found guilty of murdering his sister-in-law Catharine. David McKisson was executed on February 8, 1838, in Ravenna (Northfield then being a part of Portage County), and contemporary accounts estimate the attendance at the public hanging from several thousand to 15,000. This was the second execution in Portage County, the first having taken place in 1816. The present house replaced the log cabin in which the murder took place.

Murder is a social (or entrisocial) phenomenon. At the very least, it is of intense concern to social. This house has always been known locally as the home of the family of the murdered woman, and by inference commemorates an early and notable event for the people of Summit County ATIONAL

In addition, the house is one of the few existing and certainly best preserved examples in the locality of a house combining characteristic features of both the late Colonial vernacular and the mature Greek Revival style.


