Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The house at 240 West College Street was built in 1861 by the noted local architect Orin Porter. The house was built on a fourteen acre tract of land lying between North Main Street and College Street. The east portion of the tract was sold in the early 1900s and the houses at 226 and 250 College Street were built at this time. The Orin Porter house now stands off a private lane that runs from West College Street, on a wooded, secluded lot.

The house is a frame Italianate building, with an irregular cross-shaped plan. The central section of the building is two stories high and has a hip roof. A two story, single bay projection dominates the center of the facade. It has a low pitch, gable roof with wide returns and pronounced brackets under the eaves. There is a bullseye window in the gable and twin arched windows just beneath. The projection contains a recessed entrance, which is capped by a pedimented hood and heavy brackets. There is a rear, gable roofed extension, that was originally only a single story. The roof was raised slightly in the 1960s in order to make a bedroom from the original attic space. A screened-in porch was also added to the east side of the house in the 1960s.

The interior has been little changed from its original form. The original poplar floors are still in use in the kitchen and in the upstairs bedrooms. The living room, dining room and hall floors are in oak, which covers the original floors. An outstanding curved walnut banister and stair rail rises to the right of the entrance. An off-center hall leads to the dining room and living room. A room opening from the dining room and to the left of the entry hall has had modern windows replacing the original to provide light for an artist's workroom. All other windows are original, including much of the original window panes. The house is well maintained and still has integrity of design and setting.

There is one non-contributing garage. The exact date of the garage is unknown, but was in a dilapidated condition when the current owner bought the property in the 1960s. This garage has been modernized for use as an artist's studio.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Orin Porter House is significant under Criteria B for its association with the noteworthy local architect, Orin Porter, who designed, built and lived in this house for ten years; and under Criteria C as an excellent example of Italianate architecture. It conforms to Property Type FI, Domestic, Civic and Commercial Architecture, 1850/1907, relating to Historic Context Statement 3, Railroad Prosperity; Merchant Builders.

Orin Porter was one of a distinguished family of architects practicing in this area in the early nineteenth century. Architect-builder Lemuel Porter is recognized as one of the finest early architects; Simeon Porter, his eldest son and apprentice, became well-known in the Hudson and Cleveland areas as a practicing architect. Lemuel Porter died in 1829 before fulfilling his contract with Western Reserve College for the construction of the college chapel, the contract then turned over to Simeon Porter for completion. The success of this project began an illustrious career in architecture and building. In the early 1840s, Simeon Porter built a house on the parcel of land where 240 College Street now stands; it was destroyed by fire a few years later. Orin Porter, the youngest son of Lemuel, only nine years old when his father died, had by this time been trained by Simeon in the skills of the trade. In 1861, having successfully completed two projects still extant, 230 Aurora Street (1860) and 394 North Main Street (1857), he built his own residence on this land, replacing the burned-out Simeon Porter house.

The style of this house shows typical Porter characteristics and the influence of the popular Italianate and the local Greek Revival style tradition on Porter. The low front gable and long returns Porter also used on the Italianate house at 230 Aurora Street; the twin arched windows in the front facade, under a bullseye window, the pronounced brackets and the pedimented hood also are signature elements of Porter's work. Orin Porter lived in the house until his death in 1871. This house represents the culmination of his years of training in the profession. It has suffered very few changes, none affecting its integrity, and, as Porter's personal residence, of historic value in a community which was home to the illustrious Porter family of master-builders.
