Describe present and historic physical appearance.

226 College Street is a two-and-a-half story Tudor Revival style house designed by John William Creswell Corbusier in 1917. The house is sited well back on a large lot at the corner of College and High Streets, adjacent to Western Reserve Academy. It was the third of a trio of houses built at the north end of College Street, which includes an Italianate Villa and the Pierce House built in 1855. The house features a steeply pitched hip roof with a twin-gabled dormer and decorative finials. A prominent gable pierces the facade and caps the recessed porch entryway. The second story extends slightly over the first story with wooden braces underneath the overhang. The second story is stucco with decorative half-timbering. The first story is common bond brick construction with limestone trim around the windows and entry. The entrance is recessed under a stone arch and its double doors each have an arched light with elaborate tracery. Windows on the first floor are large eighteen light casements with stone surrounds and drip mouldings; the windows on the second floor are slightly small twelve light casements. A 1987 rear addition, a 9' x 21' two story bay with casement windows is carefully matched to the original house.

The interior plan is open, with a large entry hall and stairwell with curved polished oak stair rail. The floors are made of oak, and the trim is oak and walnut.

A circa 1950 wood frame garage is sited at the far southwest corner of the property and is non-contributing. The original lot extended 155 feet farther west and was subdivided in the late 1970s.

The building retains integrity of design and setting. The property type is F/I, Domestic, Commercial, Civic and Institutional Architecture, 1907/1925, relating to Historic Context Statement 4, Historic Restoration; the Ellsworth Years, of the Multiple Property Documentation.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The house at 226 College Street is significant under Criterion C in that it was designed and constructed by John William Creswell Corbusier, a nationally known architect, and was the first Tudor Revival house in Hudson. The house was the personal residence of Corbusier. It has retained integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling and association.

Corbusier was born in Rochester, New York in 1878. He studied architecture in New York and at L'Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris. He married Katherine Lyman in 1905 and moved to Cleveland the same year where he began his practice of architecture. His firm Corbusier, Lenski, and Foster was responsible for the design and building of the Church of the Covenant, 11205 Euclid Avenue, Cleveland, Ohio (1911) (in association with the national firm of Cram, Goodhue and Ferguson), the Church of the Saviour, 2537 Lee Road, Cleveland Heights, Ohio (1928) and the grand French Provincial Villa of Salmon P. Halle on Park Road in Shaker Heights, Ohio. He became an authority on church building, having designed over thirty churches throughout the United States before his death in 1928.

He came to Hudson in 1913. He had done previous work in Hudson for James W. Ellsworth in the building of the house at 53 Aurora Street, a brick Neo-Classical residence, which James W. Ellsworth presented to the Congregational Church for use as a parsonage, and in the renovation of the Straight and Son Cheese Storehouse, adapted for use as a club house. His move to Hudson coincided with the date of one of his major projects for Ellsworth, the design and construction of Seymour Hall of Western Reserve Academy in 1913. In 1917, he designed Oviatt Street School, still in use as an elementary school, and in 1922, the Neo-Classical Revival Ellsworth Hall of Western Reserve Academy. He built the house at 226 College Street in 1917, and lived in it until his death in 1928.

By 1917 Tudor Revival was an extremely popular building style in the suburbs, but was unknown in the smaller exurban villages such as Hudson, Ohio. The J.W.C. Corbusier house was the first Tudor Revival building in Hudson and is still one of the very few in town today. Although the Corbusier House is unlike the other more classical buildings he designed, Corbusier designed it in the same spirit as found in all his revival style architecture. The Chateauesque Salmon Halle building, the Georgian Revival Seymour Hall

and the Neo-Classical Ellsworth Hall, like the Tudor Revival Corbusier House, were all new interpretations of old European styles of architecture. The Corbusier House is an excellent example of Tudor Revival style architecture, featuring a steeply pitched hip roof with sharp cross-gable and paired dormer windows; second story decorative half-timbering on stuccoed walls; large, multi-light windows; and a recessed entry way. It relates to Property Type FII, Domestic, Commercial and Civic Architecture, 1907/1925, and relates to Historic Context 4, Historic Restoration: the Ellsworth Years, of the Multiple Property Documentation.
