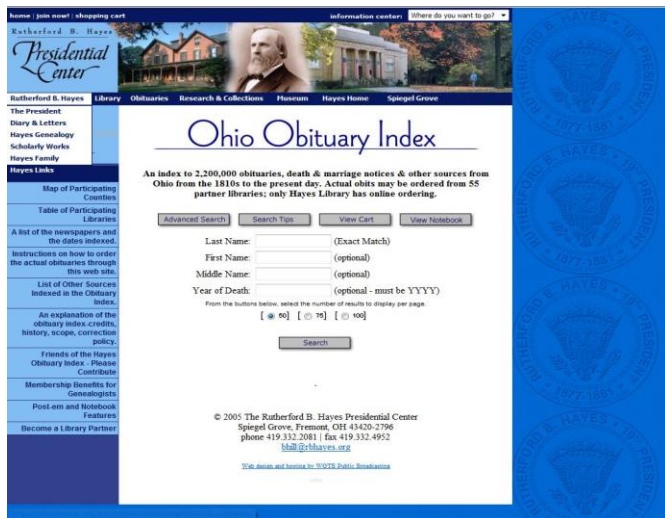

Special Collections Joins the Hayes Library's Ohio Obituary Index

With nearly 60 contributing libraries and more than 2.2 million database entries, the [Ohio Obituary Index](#), administered by the [Hayes Research Library](#) at the [Rutherford B. Hayes Presidential Center](#), is an excellent resource for Ohio genealogy research. The Akron-Summit County Public Library is excited to join the project this year.

For several years, Special Collections has made its two major obituary resources, the [Akron Beacon Journal \(ABJ\) newspaper indexes, 1841-1939](#) and the [Obituary only indexes, 1937-2012](#), available on our Web site in PDF. While publishing the indexes on our website has made them accessible to a much wider audience, using the online indexes has its limitations. Due to the poor quality of the text in the originals, the ABJ newspaper indexes have not been subjected to optical character recognition (OCR) and therefore are not keyword searchable. Users must browse these alphabetical subject indexes just as they would the books. While the obituary only indexes underwent OCR and are searchable *individually*, users cannot search across all indexes at once. Adding obituary citations from both of these indexes to the Hayes database will not only make obituary searches quicker and easier, it will also lead more researchers to the many resources available through Special Collections. The Ohio Obituary Index well known among those researching Ohio families,



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and it is also among the sources searchable through Ancestry. Special Collections staff members began making entries into the Ohio Obituary Index in January. We are starting with the current year's obituaries and the earliest years of the ABJ newspaper indexes. As the year progresses, we will continue adding entries based on the newspaper indexes, and we will import nearly 140,000 records from 21 of our obituary indexes. Even with this import, the project will entail a great deal of data entry and will likely take several years to complete. Until then, feel free to contact Special Collections or [visit the Hayes Web site](#) to check which years are covered in the Ohio Obituary Index, and continue to use the indexes on our Web site as needed.

Volunteer Indexers Wanted

Our goal in joining the Hayes Research Library's Ohio Obituary Index is twofold—to create a single, fully searchable index to obituaries published in the *Akron Beacon Journal* and its predecessors, and to make that index known to the widest possible audience. With your help, we can reach our goal much more quickly. Volunteers must have computer skills and be detail oriented. Detailed instructions and hands-on training will be provided. Getting to Know... Dr. Shirla McClain

This is the first installment of our new Past Pursuits series “Getting to Know...,” in which we provide brief introductions to some of the people, places, and events that have had an impact on the history and culture of Summit County.

Akron native Dr. Shirla Robinson McClain was an educator and local historian whose 500-page doctoral dissertation, *The Contributions of Blacks in Akron: 1825-1975*, filled the void left by local histories up to that point. Her dissertation became and remains the most authoritative work on the history of African Americans in Akron.

Dr. McClain started her teaching career with Head Start and taught in the Akron Public Schools for 20 years, resigning after receiving her PhD in education from the University of Akron in 1975. She then taught as a professor of education at Kent State University and Walsh University.

Dr. McClain died of cancer in 1997. In 1999, The Shirla McClain Gallery of Akron’s Black History and Culture opened at the University of Akron. The digitized version of *The Contributions of Blacks in Akron: 1825-1975* can be accessed from the

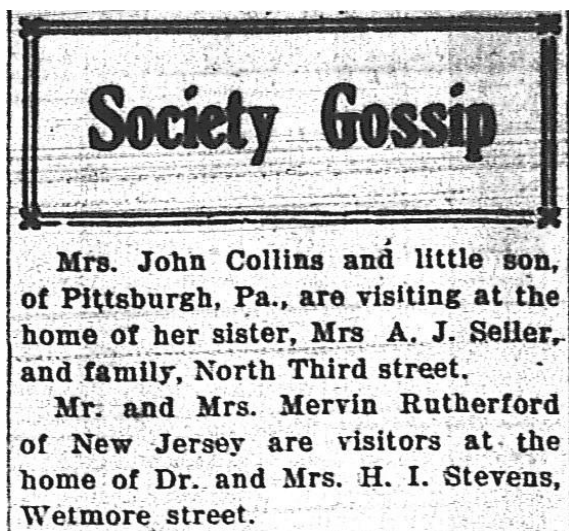
Beyond the Akron Beacon Journal: Summit County Newspapers on Microfilm

Of the many wonderful resources available in the Special Collections Division, our microfilmed local newspapers are among the most used in the collection. Reels of the *Akron Beacon Journal* and its previous incarnations are pulled daily as librarians and library users peruse more than 170 years of information, seeking answers on their ancestors or historical accounts from a contemporary source. Requests for obituaries and news stories keep the phone ringing and the inbox pinging, while researchers, genealogists and hobby historians alike find answers (and sometimes more questions) scanning a century and a half of local news.

Often overlooked, though, are the lesser known publications. In addition to the *Beacon Journal*, the *Akron Times Democrat*, *Akron Press* and *Akron Reporter* covered city and county stories for decades. Court proceedings, real estate transactions and legal matters were chronicled in the *Akron Legal News*, while the *Akron Germania* and *Akron Columbia* served Akron's German-speaking population. Representing neighboring cities were the *Cuyahoga Falls Reporter*, *Barberton News*, *Portage Lakes-Kenmore Post* and *Ohio Observer* (Hudson), with newspapers from communities in Cuyahoga and Portage Counties also available. Equally rich in local content were publications from area organizations, including Goodyear's *Wingfoot Clan* newsletter, *Summit County Labor News* and *Veterans' News*, with combined coverage of more than 100 years.

Summit Memory Update

With more than 15,000 images and counting, [Summit Memory](#) continues to be a one-of-a-kind digital resource for Summit County history. Established in 2007, this online scrapbook has grown to include 46 [collections](#) from 17 [agencies](#) throughout the county.

A new addition to Summit Memory is the [Edwin Shaw Hospital Collection](#), contributed by the County of Summit. This unique collection includes more than 30 images from the early decades of the hospital originally known as Springfield Lake Sanatorium. The sanatorium, which opened in East Akron in 1915, was constructed for the treatment of tuberculosis patients prohibited from receiving treatment at general hospitals. This historic collection includes images of the facility and grounds located on former farmland near Springfield Lake, as well as the Sunshine Cottage, the sanatorium's pediatric center which championed the "sun cure" and open-air learning for children at risk for developing tuberculosis.

New Class: Identifying Your Family Photographs

Every photograph holds clues about the person, place or time depicted—the trick is learning to read these clues and decipher what they can tell us about the image. Observing characteristics such as the type of photograph, the fashions of the subjects and items found in the background can reveal much about historic images. Paired with the skills and resources already used in our genealogy research, these clues can go a long way toward unlocking the stories behind our family photographs.



This spring, the Special Collections Division offers a new class, *Identifying Your Family Photographs*, Saturday, May 4, 10 am – noon. The class will provide tips and techniques for reading and researching historic images, including an overview of the different types

of photographs and photographic processes, discerning clues found within images, such as clothing and hairstyles, and using a variety of resources to research and identify historic photographs. 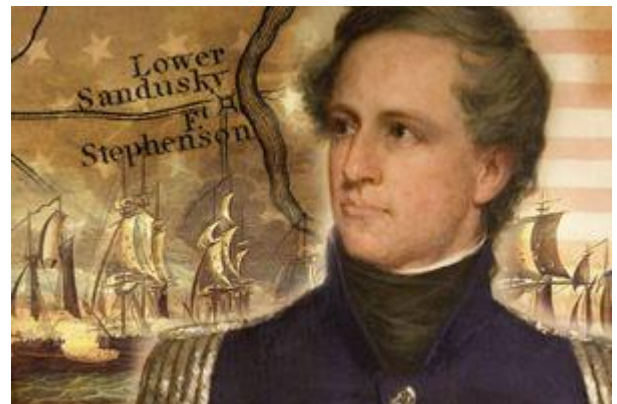

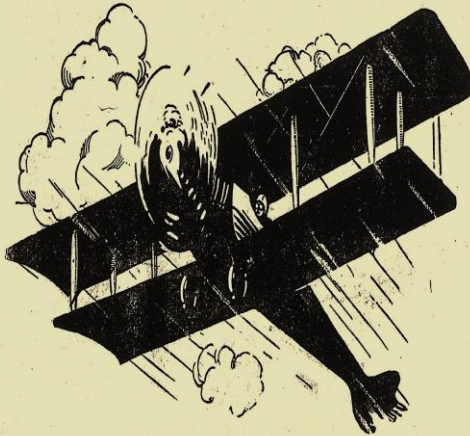
